COMMODORE'S REPORT FOR 1991-92

Again it is my privilege to present the 120th Annual Report of the Sydney Amateur Sailing Club.

In spite of the difficult financial times which have placed extraordinary demands on the resources and daily work loads of many of our members, the club has managed to retain membership levels, racing, social activities, repairs and maintenance programmes. This has been achieved through the efforts of club staff, committees and members.

The popularity of Friday twilight races and the social activities which follow have again justified the work involved and provided indication of the type of sailing events members are looking for. Activities in the club — traditional divisions have been maintained during this season through the efforts of Bill Gale, the Division Representatives and the Sailing Committee. The Sunday metre division racing has provided another dimension to harbour racing and it is hoped that this activity can be continued to give owners of large classic yachts the opportunity to race and show their magnificent vessels on a not so crowded Sydney Harbour.

As is the case with most enterprises today, the Board of Directors of the Sydney Amateur Sailing Club has been preoccupied with management of resources and maintaining viability of operations. While no major projects have been undertaken over the last year continuous maintenance and upgrading of facilities has taken place and paid for out of operating income. This has been made possible through the expert control and money management of Fred Bevis, the Club Treasurer and through the provision of free professional services and volunteer labour of many of the club's active members. These achievements and those involved are too numerous to mention individually but have been fundamental to the club's operations in recent years.

As this is my third and final year as the Commodore, I wish to take this opportunity of thanking those members who have contributed so generously with time and resources and so have made projects like wharf repairs, and change room upgrade possible. While I will soon hand the duties of Commodore over to those who follow, I certainly hope to participate in programmes which make our club a great club and offers facilities to members unequalled in Sydney.

To my fellow Flag Officers and Directors, I wish to express my appreciation for loyal and continued support during my term as Commodore.

To Phil, Bernard, James and Jack in the boatshed — thanks for a job well done and for all the help you have given to me.

To Faye Buckley, I can only seek to record my appreciation for all you have done for the club and for me in administering the duties as Commodore. Thank you again and keep up the good work.

FINANCE

Overview: Revenue increased by 2% to \$434,582 and expenditure increased by 10% to \$453,541. The Club returned an operating loss of \$18,959 for the year. This loss arose after charging, planned expenditure of \$43,410 for the renovation of the men's washrooms and \$4,935 for repairs to the wharf.

Total membership declined by 8 during the year to 415. The number of Ordinary members has declined by 23 in the past year and 19 the previous year. The decline in membership continues and, as mentioned in last year's report, requires positive action to reverse the trend. A plan to increase membership should be developed in the coming year.

For the first time ever the Club has vacant moorings. These are a valuable resource and should not be left vacant without first taking positive action to promote the benefits of Club membership including the availability of moorings, tender service and slip facilities.

No major capital works were undertaken during the year.

Administration: Membership fees declined slightly reflecting the decline in membership numbers. Interest and commissions declined following the reduction in interest rates. Expenditure fell slightly to \$64,347 resulting in a surplus of \$17,545 compared to \$25,140 the previous year.

Racing: Revenue rose to \$19,802 compared to \$16,928 the previous year. Expenditure rose by \$1,808 to \$33,266 resulting in a loss of \$13,464.

Boatshed: Total revenue increased to \$262,228. Total expenditure declined due to lower repairs and maintenance this year. Repairs the previous year included \$40,000 for the renovation of the wharf. This reduction was partly offset by increased insurance costs and the rise in labour and materials which increased from \$121,748 to \$134,827 compared to shipwright sales which only increased from \$146,686 to \$147,877. This trend will need to be closely monitored in the coming year.

Clubhouse: Total receipts grew from \$55,575 to \$61,825. Total expenditure, after eliminating the cost of the renovation of the men's washrooms, grew from \$84,198 to \$92,506.

BOATSHED

Vice-Commodore's Report

Sub-Committee: Peter Wargent, Russ Chapman, Mike deBurca and both Jim Lawler and Jim Lawler (Senior).

As this current club year comes to a close, one reflects on the year's achievements from both staff and club volunteers, and our boatshed crew, headed by Phil McWilliams, maintained and improved results for this department.

Boatshed turnover modestly increased this year. Surplus also improved at a greater rate, and is the result of lower costs in the repair and maintenance column, as last year's cost to rebuild No. 3 cradle was totally taken up in that year. Faye Buckley, who manages the boatshed accounting administration, has contributed to the above financial results and we thank Faye for her consistent effort.

This was a year of general downturn for most businesses and in fact the country. Over the year our slips have averaged 46% occupancy as a result from slipping 300 boats. The boatshed has performed well, and we thank members for their positive support in this regard.

Our boatshed staff of course are not only responsible for the club's cash flow from paid boatshed work, but also for necessary and mandatory maintenance of the club's equipment and boats.

The club's best assets are in fact its members and over the years many projects and improvements to our club have been completed by members volunteering their services. This year again members rallied for a major re-planking of part of our wharf, work being completed over two Saturdays, two weeks apart. Members and friends came and went as time permitted and we managed to maintain a workforce of 30 people throughout both days and thank all members, plus friends and crew for a job well done.

This year I would like to highlight a very special and effective team of tender drivers employed by the club, we have come along way from the member's son who manned the work boat for three or four hours Saturday afternoon during the racing season.

This year the club provided full tender services for all weekends including long weekends plus Friday night twilight racing, special feature race days, as well as tender service at the Basin Pittwater for the Bob Brown Presentation, and thank the six tender drivers headed by Patrick Quirk also for a job well done.

Our club's 70 moorings have again received their annual inspection and service work was carried out by Manly Boatshed, no major problems were reported again this year. Mooring occupancy has averaged 97% during the year and we currently have 5 moorings available for lease, these to suit yachts from 22ft (6.7m) to 32ft (9.8m).

Future development of our club facilities is ongoing and will require our planning committees' constant review and vision. We must keep in touch with our members, the club's future must be assured by thoughtful planning, good judgement and attention to detail.

In finalising this year's report and before stepping down as Vice Commodore, a position held for the last three years, I would like to paraphrase the last paragraph of the Amateurs (page 210), as I think it most appropriate for today, as it was in 1963 and will be in the year 2000.

"One thing is certain. The Club enjoys a wonderful location and has an enviable reputation of being a pleasant organisation to belong to, free from the pressures and attitudes which are so much the bane of many other clubs, and is unique in the respect that it must be the only club of its size and consequence which has not overspent itself, still has a credit balance at the bank and still runs profitably.

May it always remain that way."

I again look forward to assisting members in the club's new financial year, good racing and we should see you on the starting line next season.

DEVELOPMENT

During the year a plan was prepared for the improvement of the park areas immediately surrounding the club. This work will be advanced as resources are available as a contribution to the maintenance of the excellent environment we enjoy on the shores of Mosman Bay.

The Friday Twilight volunteers in particular will be pleased to hear that we will be lightening the load for the forthcoming season. The Board has accepted the Clubhouse Committee's recommendation and has approved new dishwashing facilities, and equipment is now on order.

At the beginning of the racing season, the concept of "Officer of the Day" was introduced into the Clubhouse, and has been working well, resulting in better service to members and guests after the races.

A major expense this year involved the renovation and upgrading of the men's change and washroom facilities, and we appreciate the help and assistance given by Michael Tomaszewski for the project.

The spirit of the club is self-help, to keep costs down, and the Amateurs continues to receive praise from other clubs in this regard.

RACING

At the end of the Racing Year 1991/92, we can look back and see that the SASC members continue to support the club by racing with us.

Although the depressed economic conditions continue to affect all of us, the club has been fortunate in maintaining fleet size and ensuring competitive racing for all. Entries for regular Saturdays racing were 77 with a further 15 boats entered for the Division 7 racing every three to four weeks.

Twilight racing continued to be popular with members and their guests with a total entry 79 boats. Although we never managed to have all out on the same night, the racing was good and the barbecues afterwards were excellent. This year we extended the twilight races for three weeks after the completion of daylight saving by starting an hour earlier. The response was sufficient to convince the Race Committee that this practice will continue.

A new series was instituted this year for boats built to, or as derivatives of, the various International metre rules. The series was run over five Sundays and will be repeated next year. The entry of Gretel II in the races together with a range of 5.5, 6, 8 and 30 sq metre boats made for quite a spectacle. Bill Gale and Garth Stewart are to be thanked for their efforts in getting this series started.

This was our year to run the Half-Ton Racing for the combined RSYS and SASC boats. As usual the racing was closely contested. For the first time at their request, we ran a combined fleet of S.80 boats with MHYC. This arrangement enabled the full fleet to race with the SASC and the MHYC week about. The exercise was a complete success with all participants pleased with the added competition.

While discussing MHYC, we should point out that the SASC retained the "Daydream Shield" again. It was much closer this year with eight races each. As the SASC were the current holders we retained the shield.

It was pleasing to see the high level of entries in the "Bob Brown Trophy" race to Pittwater at Easter. Nineteen boats started and enjoyed a fast run to Coaster's retreat.

My thanks to Peter Pangas and Roy Simmonds who have made my year as Chairman easy. Their efforts and those of the Start Boat crew ensure that each week we have the ability to board our boats and know that the racing will be close and well organised.

I would also remind all members that the policy of the Race Committee is to work for the members. Please continue to assist us by passing your ideas and comments to Committee members for consideration and encouraging members and non-members alike, to race with us next year.

PRINCIPAL ACTIVITY OF THE CLUB

The principal activity of the Club during the financial year was to promote the sport of amateur sailing.

There was no significant change in the nature of that activity during the year.

TRADING RESULTS

The net loss of the Club for the year ended 31st May, 1992 was \$18.959. No provision for income tax was necessary.

REVIEW OF OPERATIONS

The Club successfully continued to conduct its Saturday, Twilight and Winter racing program and other special events.

During the year the men's washroom was renovated and upgraded at a cost of \$43,410, and a major portion of wharf decking was replaced at a cost of \$4,935 not including time graciously donated by Club members. These items have been treated as an expense in the current year.

The boatshed operation showed a small increase over the previous period.

During the year 37 members (including 6 junior members) joined the club for a net decrease in membership of 8.

SIGNIFICANT CHANGES

No significant changes have occured during the year.

EVENTS SUBSEQUENT TO BALANCE DATE

In the interval between the end of the financial year to the date of this report, no matter or circumstance has arisen that has significantly affected or may significantly affect:—

- (i) the operations of the Club;
- (ii) the results of those operations; or
- (iii) the state of affairs of the Club in subsequent financial years.

LIKELY DEVELOPMENTS IN THE CLUB'S OPERATIONS

The Club will continue to promote the sport of amateur sailing through its racing and training programs.

DIRECTORS' BENEFITS

Since the end of the previous financial year no Director of the Club has received or become entitled to receive a benefit by reason of a contract made by the Club with the Director or with a firm of which he is a member, or with a company in which he has a substantial financial interest.

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS

1. STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The following is a summary of the significant accounting policies which have been adopted in the preparation of the Club's accounts. Unless otherwise stated such accounting policies were also adopted in the preceding year.

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and do not take into account changing money values, except to the extent to which they are reflected in the revaluation of certain assets.

DEPRECIATION AND AMORTISATION OF FIXED ASSETS

Fixed assets are being depreciated or amortised on the straight line method by sufficient charges to write off the costs of the assets over their expected useful lives.

STOCK ON HAND

Stock on hand has been valued on a first in, first out basis at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

INCOME TAX

No provision for income tax is necessary as the Club is exempt from taxation by virtue of the provisions of Section 23(g) of the Income Tax Assessment Act.

FINANCIAL REPORTING BY SEGMENTS

The Club operates predominantly in one industry — the promotion of amateur sailing, and in one geographical area — Sydney.
