COMMODORE'S REPORT

In the centenary year of 1972 The Amateurs staged a nostalgic occasion to celebrate its 100 years. The success of the regatta for old gaff rigged vessels was such that it was agreed to make it a triennial event. In 1978, six years later, we staged the third Gaff Riggers Day with 39 entrants.

The event attracted craft from all corners of the harbour and from as far away as U.K. from whence came the eventual winner, the Falmouth Quay punt "Curlew" built in 1896.

The Club entertained Flag Officers from all the Senior Yacht Clubs. The event is becoming a highlight of the year's yachting calendar and it is anticipated that it will grow in stature and the Amateurs will be proud of hosting the occasion for years to come. We are grateful to Bill Gale for the effort he has put into it.

The year has been notable for another event of significance. The planning of previous years has culminated in the possession of a starter's boat of ample proportion and elegant appearance. She was christened by the Commodore's wife, Mrs. C. Crisp, the 'Captain Amora' in honour of the Club's first Commodore, a sea captain, expatriate South American, domiciled in Australia in the late 19th Century. The vessel is a sturdy, traditionally constructed, timber framed planked craft worthy of the seafarer's name she carries.

She is the envy of our sister clubs and has already done sterling work finishing the Bob Brown Trophy race in Pittwater this year. She is a credit to our members John Jeremy and Bob Lawler, who put great personal effort into acquiring and fitting her out, but it was with even greater devotion that Bill Lawler, a member of long standing, persisted up to the time of his death with the challenge of seeing her ready for duty.

The Idle Hour Trophy inaugurated by Tony Furse as a social rendezvous occasion and bearing the name of his yacht has over the years become a tradition within the Club.

Bill Lawler acquired Idle Hour after Tony's death and this season he attended his last official Club event aboard Idle Hour with her fully dressed as flag ship.

This season saw ten divisions and some 130 yachts registered on the programme. The Club was host to the Triton 24's, Endeavour 24's and Swanson Darts for whom it successfully organised championships. The Production Yacht Challenge was highly successful and has now become a premiere event in our calendar.

The half ton boats of the Amateurs and R.S.Y.S. staged a merging of their fleets so that for the summer season the joint fleet raced under the Squadron banner. Next season the joint fleet will race under the Amateur banner. The Board saw this as being in the best interests of the owners and are pleased to be party to co-operation of this sort with a sister club.

On the financial side, members can be assured that your Directors have managed your money wisely, being prudent where thrift is required and bold where forward viewing is appropriate. Plans are still afoot for renovations to the Club House and these will carry over into the next year.

All officers, committees and staff have once again performed in untiring fashion and on behalf of the members, I thank them all.

It is pleasing to note that the period just concluded has resulted in a further consolidation of a number of resources so important to the welfare of the Club.

In the area of membership, the movement indicated a result compatible with earlier planning. Your Board is ever mindful of the need for continual review of the quality and size of club membership.

Last year's report indicated that your Committee was working on proposals to assist the Board in its consideration of the next stage of its redevelopment programme. It is pleasing to note that on the authority of your Board, the Bank was approached to assist in this programme. Based on a projection of club earnings, sufficient additional accommodation was arranged to enable the two principal projects for the year to be committed.

These were the acquisition of a new starter's boat and the renovation of the next section of your clubhouse. The starter's boat was successfully commissioned and plans and specifications have now been finalised for the reconstruction of the club kitchen and tenders have been called.

Charges were again reviewed during the period and whilst the Committee was mindful of the need to contain costs on the one hand, it recognised the need to maintain a service to its members. It is anticipated that the recent modest increases against the full range of club services will achieve the desired balance in these areas.

CLUBHOUSE

Generally the past year has been most successful with an increasing number of members taking advantage of the Clubhouse activities.

Due to the planned rebuilding of the kitchen it has been necessary to curtail some social functions at the Club.

There has been a delay in this work being carried out due to an assessment of the total building work necessary.

However, the Architect has prepared the plans, they have been approved by the Council, tenders have been submitted and the Directors have given the go-ahead, so it will soon be completed.

The Annual Dinner Dance and Prize Giving night held at the end of the last season at Hunters Hill Bowling Club was fully booked out and everyone there had a happy night.

The Club Christmas function this year was held at the Lowenbrau Keller in the Rocks where a large number of members and their friends danced, sang and dined on large quantities of food and liquid refreshments.

Gaffers Day was held again this year and the Clubhouse Committee catered for approximately 300 members and visitors. Arrangements were made for the MV "Bennelong" to follow the Gaffers around the Harbour and it was gratifying to the Committee to see the large number go aboard.

Northcott Day was a successful day, well attended with Clubhouse catering sufficient to satisfy the large number of children, members and friends.

The Clubhouse Committee also catered for the annual Daydream Shield participants at Taylors Bay.

Monthly General meetings have continued to be well attended with interesting speakers.

At one meeting members and their friends were entertained by Pauline and Tim Carr who were visiting Australia from the United Kingdom in their gaff rigged yacht "Curlew".

On another occasion Mrs. Gash, who sailed around the world in her Folkboat, told about her voyage. This was an outstanding evening.

The subjects continued and ranged from a practical demonstration in the Clubhouse on how to launch and use a Beaufort liferaft to details of the new Maritime Museum, a talk on a cruise around the Pacific Islands and another on cruising in the canals of Europe.

Members will note the splendid restoration work on the card tables and to the interior of the Clubhouse which has been carried out by Carl Speers.

The Clubhouse Committee thanks the members for their support during the year and also record its thanks to Mrs. Nicolls, Mrs. Percival, Tony Ashleigh, Peter Wargent and Carl Speers for their contribution to the Clubhouse activities.

DEVELOPMENT

Following the allotment of definite finance to re-furbish the kitchen area, planning began in earnest in September, in close collaboration with Vice Commodore Vic Dibben and members of the Clubhouse Committee, who had identified the Club's needs for catering and storage.

With expert guidance from our Architect, Graham McKinlay, suitable plans were agreed upon, and passed through North Sydney Council in February.

Tenders have been called, and it is anticipated that work will be completed during the winter.

General maintenance of the Club buildings is now vested in this Committee; members will have noted the upgrading of the Clubhouse by Carl Spears' expert craftsmanship.

RACING

The Racing Season was marked by contrasting weather with a predominance of heavy breezes. The fleet was divided between 10 divisions with approximately 130 boats.

As the Chairman and the Secretary were newcomers to the Race Committee scene, much of the weight of organisation was thrown upon the shoulders of division representatives, all of whom took an active part in ensuring that errors to point scores or handicaps were corrected.

John Jeremy, furthering his report of the previous year, was instrumental in the purchase of a new starter's boat. The Lawler brothers then set about, with the help of others, converting the fishing boat into a seagoing Club vessel. All dreams were fulfilled when the said craft finished the Bob Brown Trophy Race at Pittwater. This will be a race to be in next year.

The most notable event of the year regarding racing was the Production Yacht series won by the S80 and Bluebird classes. Past Chairman, Peter Hamilton, with amazing organisational powers, ran this so well that it is an event that will be of great value to the prestige of the Club in years to come. His efforts were much appreciated.

The Amateur ½ Ton fleet combined with that of the R.S.Y.S. after the Spring Pointscore at the request of the Skippers of the yachts involved. The coming year should see a large fleet racing under the Amateur flag. This successful venture may herald further combinations of fleets as the S.A.S.C. is gearing up to cater for larger yachts, with more thorough safety inspections and a seagoing starter's boat.

My thanks to all who contributed with time and assistance during the past year, and fair sailing.

CRUISING

A meeting of members held at the Club on 8th May, 1978, considered that a Cruising Division should be established within the Amateurs.

The Inaugural Meeting of the Division was held on 25th July, 1978 and Dr. Frank Talbot was elected its first Chairman. Frank has been a driving force in the development of this area of the social side of our sailing activities.

During the year he has arranged for many interesting speakers to address the members. Of note, we recall the late Bill Lawler, the Darlings, Joe Adams, along with other members of the Division who recounted their more memorable experiences

Two rendezvous were held. On 13th December, 1978, thirteen (13) yachts along with members of their families, gathered in Middle Harbour. This was followed by a gathering in Americas Bay, Pittwater on 15th April, 1979 attended by some twenty (20) yachts. Both events proved memorable and established the camaraderie of the Division.

Meetings and rendezvous are planned for the coming season and the Division joins all members of the Club in wishing Frank and his family fair winds on his forthcoming cruise.

SYDNEY AMATEUR SAILING CLUB RACING REGULATIONS

- 1. Control.** The Committee shall have control of all matters connected with racing and shall fix race entry fees, set courses, divide yachts into divisions at its discretion and shall decide any question which may arise which is not provided for in these regulations, but a yacht shall always have the right of appeal to the Yachting Association of N.S.W. against a disqualification as a result of a protest.
- 2. Racing Rules.** Races shall be conducted under the current racing rules of the International Yacht Racing Union. Addendum B, parts 2 and 3, being Safety Regulations of the Australian Yachting Federation and the appropriate class rules all as modified by the Sailing Instructions.
- 3. Class Rules.** The Bluebird Division is open to all yachts registered with the Bluebird Association. The Quarter-Ton Division is open to yachts with the appropriate racing certificate and, by invitation, to other yachts which should be expected to rate 18.0. The Half-Ton Division is open to yachts with the appropriate racing certificate and, by invitation, to other yachts which should be expected to rate 21.5. The Thunderbird Division is open to all yachts registered with the Thunderbird Association. Yachts racing in the Thunderbird Division shall comply with the Constitution and Specifications of the Class Association.
- 4. Entries.** Entries shall be made in the form adopted by the Club and shall be forwarded to the Hon. Racing Secretary, Sydney Amateur Sailing Club, Green Street, Cremorne 2090, so as to be received at least six days prior to the event in which entry is desired. All entries are subject to the approval of the Racing Committee.
- 5. Person in Charge.** A member of a recognised Yacht Club shall be in charge of each yacht competing in a race conducted by the Club.
- 6. Number of Starters.** Unless three (3) yachts start in a Club race, it will be at the Starter's discretion to cancel the race, in which case no prize will be awarded and unless four (4) yachts start, no second prize will be given and unless six (6) yachts start, no third prize will be given.
- 7. Prizes.** The Committee shall award the prizes subject to these rules, but before they do so, the owner or his representative may be required to sign the prescribed declaration that the yacht has conformed to all Rules and Regulations.
- 8. Sails and Rigging.** Any alteration affecting the declared dimensions of hull, spars, sails or rigging, propellor, etc., shall be advised to the Hon. Racing Secretary six days prior to the event to which the alterations will apply. The spinnaker boom shall be set from the mast in such a manner that the distance between the mast and the outer end of the spinnaker boom cannot exceed half the overall length or twice the moulded beam, whichever is greater. No headsail or spinnaker shall be hoisted from any spar above the masthead.
- 9. Alternate Helmsman.** Change of regular helmsman shall be notified to the Honorary Racing Secretary or the Starter at least 24 hours before the race. A yacht may be disqualified for failing to notify. The Committee reserves the right to alter the handicap for a change of helmsman.
- 10. Dress.** Helmsmen and crews of all yachts competing shall be suitably attired, the minimum requirements in this respect being shorts and shirt.
- 11. Motors.** A yacht may be propelled by motor or towed until two minutes before it crosses the starting line.
- 12. Club Racing Flag.** Yachts when racing shall fly the S.A.S.C. racing flag at or near the masthead.
- 13. "A" Prefix Sail Numbers** shall be black and shall be worn on each side of the mainsail and spinnaker.
- 14.** When not racing Club yachts should fly the Red Ensign (or Blue Ensign) and the Club burgee.
- 15. Sale of Yachts.** Where a member disposes of his boat or sails it shall be his duty to protect the interests of the Club by removing any registered markings from the sails, withdrawing his burgee and notifying the Hon. Racing Secretary.

POINTSORES AND HANDICAPS

Club Pointscores: Each division shall have a handicap pointscore competition and divisions with a scratch start shall also have a scratch pointscore competition. Each yacht finishing will score points equal to the number of entries in the race minus the number of yachts beating her. In the handicap pointscores, additional points will be awarded: seven points for first place; four points for second place; two points for third place. Retiring yachts will receive one point. Only a yacht entered for the whole season, or entered before February 13 for the remainder of the season, will be eligible to receive points.

Yachts must discard the points of three races in the season. The points of one race must be discarded in each of the Spring and Summer pointscores — see below. Races earning the least points (including races in which the yacht did not start or finish) will be discarded.

In each division a gold medal will be awarded to the Club member earning the greatest number of handicap points; a silver medal will be awarded to the Club member earning the second greatest number of handicap points; and a bronze medal will be awarded to the Club member earning the third greatest number of handicap points. Points accumulated during the season prior to membership will be counted.

Spring Point Score—A trophy will be awarded to the yacht in each division leading in the handicap Point Score at Christmas (one (1) race discarded).

Summer Point Score—A trophy will be awarded to the yacht in each division earning the most points in the handicap Point Score from January onwards (one (1) race discarded).

Handicapping: An automatic handicap penalty will be applied of 5 minutes or 3% for a win, 3 minutes or 2% for second, 2 minutes or 1% for third. A yacht which does not start in two consecutive pointscore races will have a one minute or 1% reduction of handicap. Handicap variations may be made at the discretion of the Racing Committee.

TROPHIES

Kelly Cup: Perpetual Trophy for competition between the leading yachts from all divisions in the handicap pointscores.

Gretel Trophy—A perpetual trophy of a Gold Cup presented by the late Sir Frank Packer to the winner of the No. 1 Division Point Score.

H. S. Lloyd Memorial Trophy—A perpetual trophy presented by the Lloyd family to the winner of the Second Division Point Score.

John Taylor Cooke Memorial Trophy: A trophy presented by H. E. Pfeiffer to the winner of the No. 3 Division pointscore.

P. J. Worrall Trophy—A perpetual trophy awarded to the winner of the Thunderbird Division Scratch Point Score.

Tempest Memorial Trophy: A perpetual trophy awarded to the winner of the Metre Division pointscore.

Merrington Trophy: A perpetual trophy presented by the Merrington family to the winner of the Bluebird Division scratch pointscore.

J.O.G. Plate: A perpetual trophy awarded to the winner of the Quarter-Ton Division scratch pointscore.

Ida Trophy: A perpetual trophy awarded to the winner of the No. 5 Division pointscore.

Magic Dragon Trophy: A perpetual Trophy presented by Mr. and Mrs. Colin Bull to encourage racing in the Half-Ton Division — to be awarded to the winner of the Spring scratch pointscore.

Bill Gately Memorial Trophy: A perpetual trophy presented by the family of the late W. J. Gately to be awarded to the leading Hood 23 in the No. 4 Division scratch pointscore at Christmas.

Tingira Trophy: A perpetual Trophy presented by Dr. C. H. (Tom) Selby in recognition of the part all crews play in the successful racing performance of yachts — to be awarded to the nominated forward hand of the winning yacht in the No. 3 Division pointscore.

Bob Brown Trophy: A trophy presented by the late A. W. Furse and G. Crichton to the winner of a race to be held at Easter.

Idle Hour Trophy: A perpetual trophy presented by the late A. W. Furse, awarded to the winner of a picnic race finishing at Store Beach.

Tara-ipo Seamanship Trophy: A perpetual trophy presented by Mr. and Mrs. A. Norton-Smith to the winner of a race to test seamanship.

Daydream Shield—A perpetual trophy donated by Mr. Peter Fletcher for competition between M.H.Y.C. and S.A.S.C., in inter-club races.

Centenary Trophy: A perpetual trophy awarded to the skipper who, on handicap, wins by the greatest margin within his division in the race held closest to Founders' Day (October 1).

Centenary Plate—Each skipper who wins a gold medal scores a point towards the Centenary Plate. The first skipper to score 3 points wins the trophy outright.

DIRECTORS' REPORT

In accordance with a resolution of the board of directors, the directors' report as follows with respect to the club's surplus for the financial year ended 31st May, 1979 and the state of the club's affairs at that date.

1. The operating surplus of the club for the year ended 31st May, 1979 was \$2,550. In addition, an extraordinary gain of \$2,836 arising from the sale of the starter's boat was brought to account in the accompanying accounts. The total surplus earned by the club for the 1979 financial year was \$5,386.
2. No issue of notes or debentures was made by the club during the financial year.
3. The directors took reasonable steps before the income and expenditure statements and balance sheet were made out, to ascertain that there were no bad debts and that adequate provision was made for doubtful debts.
4. At the date of this report the directors are not aware of any circumstances which would render the amount of the provision for doubtful debts inadequate to any substantial extent.
5. At the date of this report the directors are not aware of any circumstances which would render the values attributed to current assets in the accounts misleading.
6. No charge on the assets of the club has arisen since the end of the financial year to the date of this report to secure the liabilities of any other person. No contingent liability has arisen since the end of the financial year to the date of this report.
7. No contingent or other liability has become enforceable or is likely to become enforceable within the period of twelve months after the end of the financial year which, in the opinion of the directors, will or may affect the ability of the club to meet its obligations when they fall due.
8. In the interval between the end of the financial year and the date of this report no item, transaction or event of a material and unusual nature has arisen which is likely, in the opinion of the directors, to affect substantially the results of the club's operations for the next succeeding financial year.
9. Since the end of the previous financial year no director of the club has received or become entitled to receive a benefit by reason of a contract made by the club with the director or with a firm of which he is a member or with a company in which he has a substantial financial interest.
