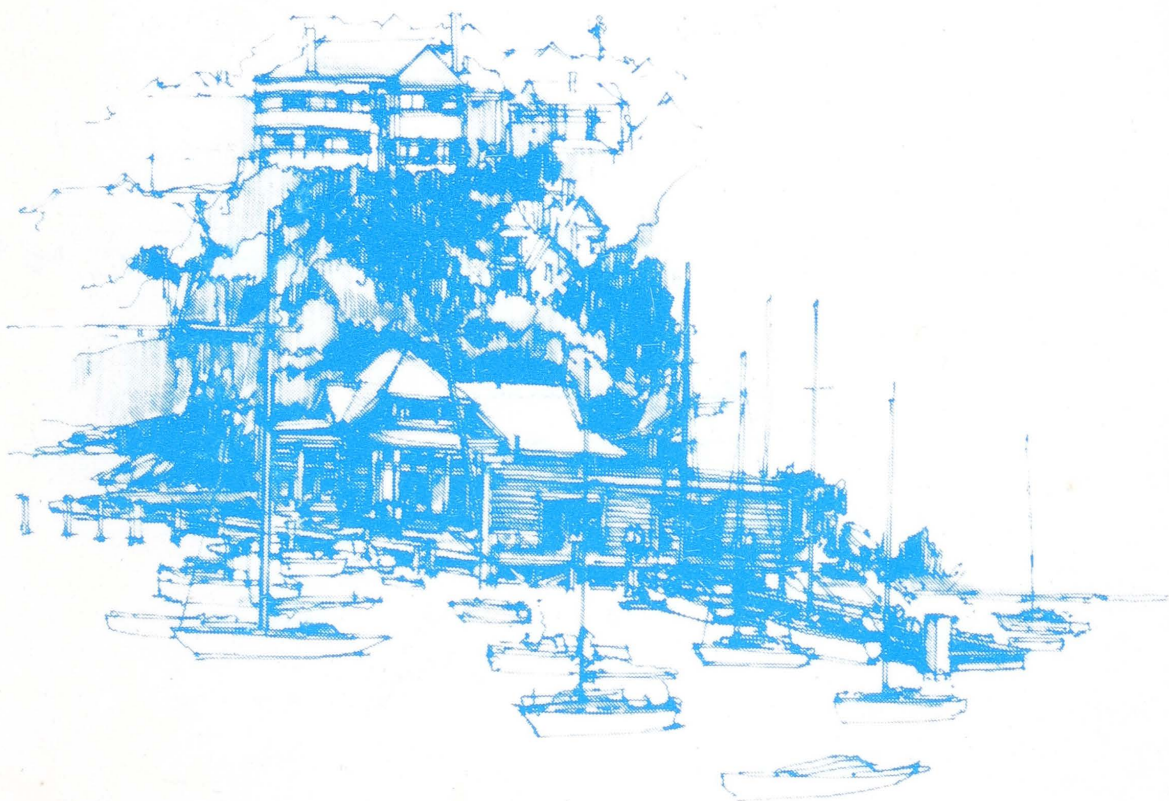

COMMODORE'S REPORT

In this 113th Annual Report of the Sydney Amateur Sailing Club, I am pleased to report on another successful year.

As usual, the Club's activities have centred around the Racing Fleet with another good season behind us. The Hon. Racing Secretary, Rosemary Hay ably supported by her team on the Racing Committee has done much to make this happen — and, of course, we are as always indebted to our starters Jack Millard and Ray King with their crew.

This year our ½ Ton yachts have been racing with the Royal Sydney Yacht Squadron as a combined fleet. This co-operation between the clubs which has been so successful over recent years provides excellent racing for the competitors and it is important for sailing members of all Sydney Clubs that we explore means such as this to gain maximum advantage from our Harbour.

The S.A.S.C. has continued to be well represented in major events conducted by other Clubs, and it was pleasing to see a good number of S.A.S.C. boats in the 1984 Sydney-Hobart, both at the start and amongst the survivors in Hobart.

In inter-club competition we failed to recover the Daydream Shield from the Middle Harbour Yacht Club, but only just, with a close result from a well attended event.

Social activities have continued to be well attended and successfully organised by the Rear Commodore and his team. I would particularly like to pay tribute to those members' wives who have laboured so hard behind the scenes on these occasions.

Once more Northcott Day was a great success in ideal weather — an event which again depends on the efforts of so many members, their families and crews.

The last twelve months have seen substantial work completed on improvements to our slipway and workshop facilities. We have also embarked on a programme of repairs and improvements to the Clubhouse and Boatshed. The roof repairs have been undertaken and I hope that the new pontoon, ramp and wharf improvements will be completed well before next season.

Much of the fabric of the Clubhouse has been subject to the tender care of Carl Speers for many years. Carl has now finally retired and I was pleased to be able to present him with a framed and suitably inscribed burgee as a memento of his long association with the S.A.S.C.

As I have now completed three years as Commodore, the time has come for me to make way for a new Commodore, in accordance with the Articles of Association. It has been an honour for me to be a Commodore of the Sydney Amateur Sailing Club and I am grateful for the opportunity to fill the position. I hope that as Immediate Past Commodore I am able to continue to assist the Club's affairs in support of the new Commodore. In this regard I would like to particularly acknowledge the support given to me and the other Flag Officers by Vic Dibben, who continues tirelessly to assist the Club's affairs, including the introduction of training courses leading to the Inshore Skippers Certificate under the A.Y.F. TL4 programme.

To all Flag Officers and Members of the Board my thanks for their loyal support throughout the year, and to our permanent and casual staff for their work for the Members.

The fall in membership disclosed by the membership table will be seen to be largely due to a culling out of ordinary members who had been struck off the lists for various reasons.

Efforts were made to contact all of these and to bring their memberships up to date. It was only when all efforts failed that the board decided that their memberships should be terminated.

Apart from this membership has remained fairly static during the year.

The net surplus for the year after payment of all expenses and making full provisions for liabilities, depreciation of assets and amortisation of leases, was \$4,844.00 as compared to last year's surplus of \$188.00.

However the financial soundness of the club lies in the conservative valuations of its assets and its strong liquid position.

All maintenance and development work including new roofing, slipways, building, etc, have been financed from current funds.

The increased revenue from the boatshed operation and moorings is particularly gratifying, the surplus of \$23,929.00 having almost doubled over the past 2 years.

Your Honorary Treasurer Mr. Fred Bevis provides detailed budgets each year which have proved very accurate and of great assistance to the Board in determining its policies for the management of the Club.

Members should be well pleased with their Club's financial strength and should continue to support the Board and its policies.

TRAINING

The S.A.S.C. was approved as an A.Y.F. Training establishment in 1984 and since then the A.Y.F. Sailing Training program has been running successfully in the Club.

A number of Members including all serving Flag Officers have successfully completed the TL4 course in accordance with the A.Y.F. Syllabus, their log books have been stamped and A.Y.F. have issued them with the appropriate Certificate. Those Members can now go anywhere and show their qualification as experienced sailors.

The courses have been conducted for Members of the S.A.S.C. and the Club has benefited from the fees received.

It is anticipated that the training programs including an Introductory Course will be open to Non-Members in the future.

BOATSHED

Vice-Commodore — F.D. Willis (Chairman); V.W. Dibben; Peter Wargent, Manager.

Considerable further work and progress has been made in upgrading the slipway and workshop facilities. This includes a principal improvement made by renewing the arms and buffering on all slipway cradles, with improved provision for staging. The cradle wheels have also been renewed. The area around the No. 1 slip has been further extended and concreted to improve working conditions and further plank and trestle racks have been provided.

Safe working conditions have been pursued with an extension control provided to the No. 2 slip winch to improve the operator's view of the slipping in progress.

Other improvements have been made to the workshop and in particular the chandlery. Please note that the First Aid is now in the cupboard above Peter Wargent's desk in the chandlery.

During the year we acquired a K.E.W. 5203k water blaster which has not only speeded up our normal slip work but extended the range of work which we can undertake.

Eric Ode has proved a great acquisition by the Club and not only does the general maintenance, which Carl Speers used to do, but drives the tender 9-5 on Sundays, cleans the clubhouse, and provides additional hands when needed in the boatyard. Welcome aboard Eric!

We are pleased also to have the services, part-time, of John Clark who also lectures part-time in Zoology at Sydney University.

Adam Fitzgerald has started on a painting and decorating course which takes place at tech 4 days a month. It is good to see trade skills being developed under the aegis of the Club. Our next target for major equipment is now spray painting gear with which we intend to further improve our services to members.

The work boats have been kept in service with numerous hiccups and very shortly will be undergoing their annual major maintenance. Captain Amora will be on the slip for 2 weeks from June 3rd and Nancy K. for one week from June 10/ weather permitting. The work and cash flow of the boatyard has been severely interrupted by extended bouts of bad weather and the Club equipment buffed by the wash of catamaran ferries but our loyal staff have carried on, smiling in the face of all difficulties.

We believe that members can see evidence of continued progress in the boatyard operations.

The committee would like to thank all those members who have been available for advice and consultation through the year, particularly Bob Lawler. We extend our special thanks to our staff, both full-time and part-time and wish to record our appreciation of the fine efforts which Peter Wargent has made in the continued development of the boatyard services.

DEVELOPMENT & MAINTENANCE

Principal activities during the year have been to:

1. Obtain approvals and cost estimates on proposed wharf extension, ramp and pontoon.
2. Repairs to the roof and roof plumbing.
3. Reorganisation of staff services.
4. Proposal to obtain Corporate sponsorship for the starting boat.

Since last reporting to the Members in 1984, the Development Committee has obtained approval from the Maritime Services Board, and the other statutory authorities involved, to the extension of the wharf on the north side of the Clubhouse and for a new ramp and an 18 metre long pontoon. This approval was obtained in November conditional upon their approval of detailed engineering drawings. These drawings were submitted to the MSB in February and we are still waiting on the Board's response. There do not appear to be any major engineering problems in the drawing, however, the turbulence caused by the wake of the new twin hull ferries, is causing the Board to reappraise the stability requirements for waterfront installations. Until this approval is forthcoming it will not be possible to finalise prices. A perspective drawing of the proposed extension will be available at the Clubhouse.

During the year, the major repairs to the roof were as follows.

- Metal decking to the east and south of the Clubhouse extensions was replaced;
- Asbestos cement to the gable over the office and female toilet were replaced;
- Dinghy shed roof was treated with rust inhibitor and painted to extend its life by approximately 5 years;
- The roof plumbing has been repaired. The major rain water leak in the men's toilet has hopefully been traced and repaired. This work has involved some lining panels in this area being removed to effect the structural repairs necessary to rectify the roof plumbing. It is proposed to leave these panels off for a period to be able to verify that the water penetration has ceased.

This year saw the resignation of Carl Speers who has been replaced by Eric Ode. Eric's role will be extended to work from Friday to Monday and be responsible for cleaning, gardening, general repairs and maintenance, and where possible, assisting in the boatshed. He will also provide a tender service for Members on Sundays.

Finally, in line with a number of other Clubs on the harbour, it was suggested that the Amateurs should look at some restrained corporate sponsorship for the starting boat from a major corporation or professional firm, and proposals have been made to a number of parties to date without success.

RACING

Far heavier conditions prevailed throughout the season than the year before. This was borne out in the results of the Montague Island Race where no competitor finished and only two Amateurs finished the Hobart Race, "Sodisal" and "Punch".

The Club racing officials have spent time in the past year consolidating our relationship with the other major Clubs by ensuring that the S.A.S.C. has been represented at all race meetings of relevance and course co-ordination meetings. As a result, the Club currently enjoys excellent "behind the scenes" relationships with all others.

The annual race between the M.H.Y.C. and the S.A.S.C. (Daydream Shield) was forfeited by the S.A.S.C. by one point. This excellent event fosters a close relationship with the M.H.Y.C. To a similar end, the Club was to conduct Easter Championships in conjunction with the R.S.Y.S. These were not held due to withdrawal of participants. However, the Cavalier 28 State Championship held in March was judged a great success by all competitors.

This coming year we welcome back the half-ton fleet.

Idle Hour Day and the Bob Brown Trophy Race to Pittwater were well attended with one prominent Club Member, sporting a hand picked crew, rushing back for the latter, from Mooloolooba in order to meet the fleet up the river. He was well rewarded that night as he witnessed a rare event, the Commodore burst into song! Rumours spread by regular Pittwater users indicate that certain bays in the Hawkesbury still ring to an indecipherable rich baritone.

The coming year is especially exciting in prospect. Our mixed divisions are ever popular. Over 20 boats should start in the Cavalier 28 Division and the Thunderbirds shall return. Further, the racing results will be computerised with a new system of handicapping that averages a boat's past 4 performances. Results should be far closer!

From this time on, the M.S.B. requires that Race Fleets are directed away from the shipping channels. Amongst others, Eastern channel pile light and Nielsen Park gas buoy are two marks directly affecting the Amateurs that will be abandoned. Substitute courses will be arranged and in some cases new marks will be laid. Please read the sailing directions carefully!

My thanks to Rosemary Hay, Race Secretary for outstanding application to duty, Nan Kartzoff, who has been responsible for the week to week mailing of results and the whole Race Committee for appropriate work and loyalty throughout the year. The S.A.S.C. thrives on volunteer labour and the Racing Organisation is a tribute to this approach.

NOTES TO AND FORMING PART OF THE ACCOUNTS

I. STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The following is a summary of the significant accounting policies which have been adopted in the preparation of the company's accounts. Unless otherwise stated such accounting policies were also adopted in the preceding year.

- (a) The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and do not take into account changing money values.
- (b) **Bank Overdraft:**
Cheques drawn and not presented at the company's bank at 31st May are classified as creditors.
- (c) **Depreciation and amortisation of fixed assets:**
Fixed assets are being depreciated or amortised on the straight line method by sufficient charges to write off the costs of the assets over their expected useful lives.
- (d) **Long service leave:**
The long service leave liability has been recorded in the accounts in respect of employees having completed at least five years' service with the company. The liability in respect of employees who will have nine years' service or more will be reflected as a current liability.
- (e) **Stock on hand:**
Stock on hand has been valued at lower of cost and net realisable value.
- (f) **Income tax:**
No provision for income tax is necessary as the company is exempted from taxation by virtue of the provisions of section 23(g) of the Income Tax Assessment Act.
- (g) **Financial reporting by segments:**
The company operates predominantly in one industry — the promotion of amateur sailing, and in one geographical area — Sydney.
