COMMODORE'S REPORT FOR 2019–2020

For the Amateurs, the last year might be best be described as akin to coming into port on a dark night with nothing but an old, outdated chart to navigate by. There are known obstacles which might be reasonably avoided with prudent action — but also some new and unforeseen dangers that just are not on the chart.

The retirement of our office staff — Megan Keogh and Judy Wogowitsch — created a significant challenge given their very long-standing and dedicated service to the Club. We have been fortunate in being able to engage Paula Morel and Karen Ewels as their replacements — luckier still both exhibit the same passion and dedication for the Amateurs as their predecessors. Together they have been leading the charge to transition and modernise our business administration and work process systems. It remains a work in progress, but significant advances have been made and members should start to see the benefits in coming months.

Over the past months we have also successfully renegotiated our leases for both the clubhouse and Green Shed. This was a somewhat complicated matter given, depending on where our property sits at the high water mark, that it involved discussions with Transport for NSW, the North Sydney Council, Mosman Council, Department of Lands and an independent contractor working for NSW Maritime. No easy feat, I can assure you!

The Board, guided by member Phil Tanner, a risk analyst professional, has also developed and implemented for the first time a comprehensive Work, Health and Safety Policy for the Club including Safety Management Systems for all our club vessels (with special thanks to Ian Anstee), slipway and on-water activities. This is not just a legal requirement but goes a long way to ensuring the safety of our staff as well as members, their families and crew.

The advent of our new crew membership category and encouraging casual crew to register for Sail Pass has helped boost our overall membership numbers considerably. Whilst the number of full members remains roughly the same at 287, we have recruited 57 new crew members to the Club which has boosted the Full Member Equivalent (FME) from 317 a year ago to 341 which will provide a significant lift in subscription income and a potential pathway to full membership. The membership committee, ably led by Tom Moult with the support of Racing Secretary Alice Murphy, has done an exceptional job in pursuing new members and welcoming them to the Club.

The COVID—19 shut down was certainly an uncharted obstacle. Fortunately, coming near the end of our summer racing season and at the start of our less frenetic winter series, the impact on our social receipts was minimised. Our staff in both the office and boatshed was prepared to work through the restrictions with sensible hygiene measures in place so that we were able to achieve an ongoing revenue stream and continue to provide access for members to the Club and their boats. As a result, our financial position remains sound. At an operations level we finished close to budget. The Club's investment portfolio, like most people's superannuation funds, took a bit of a hit with a fall in stock market prices but our overall investment strategy is very conservative, and we expect the value to recover in time. We nevertheless hold sufficient cash reserves in short term deposits to meet any foreseeable needs.

I should also like to thank all members for their patience and forbearance during the shutdown and the way in which they reacted without complaint to the rapidly-changing situation and the subsequent restrictions on access and services we were required to put in place.

Overall our infrastructure — the clubhouse and dinghy shed, slipway, decks, pontoons and our vessels — is in very good order largely, due to the efforts of a small group of volunteers under the leadership of club stalwart and resident in-house engineer Trevor Cosh. The efforts of these volunteers — combined with the club working bees — have saved the Club many hundreds of thousands of dollars over the last six years. To all those volunteers, sincere thanks to you all on behalf of the many who benefit from your generous contribution of time and effort.

Finally, as this is my last report as Commodore, I would like to pay tribute to the various directors I have been privileged to work with during my 15 years on the Board. All have contributed selflessly for the benefit of the club some over periods of very long standing. That the Club remains in robust good health and enjoys an enviable reputation amongst other clubs on the harbour is testament to their commitment and good works. I thank them all for their support, advice and opinions — of most of which I have taken heed.

I hope I leave the Club a better place and know that good and steady hands remain to steer it safely into the future.

FINANCE AND ADMINISTRATION

I am pleased to report that, in spite of the deleterious impact of COVID–19, your Club has emerged relatively unscathed and finds itself in a sound financial position heading into the new financial year.

This is mainly due to the efforts of my fellow directors, the commitment of our highly-valued staff and the loyal cooperation of the members.

A modest surplus had been forecast but the pandemic and its flow-on effect on the operations of the Club contributed to a loss of \$62,129. This is a good result under the circumstances and is due to pro-active measures taken to minimise costs to compensate for income reduction where practicable.

A major contributor to the loss was in administration which incurred an unrealised loss of approximately \$40,000 in value of the investment portfolio. This is directly attributable to the pandemic and is in line with adverse market movements in equities experienced at a global level. The portfolio is conservative in its investment mix and is expected to recover over time.

The overall value of the portfolio remains strong despite the reduction in value of equities. At 31 May 2020 equities, managed funds and cash totalled \$685,417 compared with \$650,856 in the previous financial year. The increase in the face of the downward market movement is attributable to the weighting of the cash component of the portfolio.

Other negative variations in the administration budget, including from joining fees, were compensated for by receipt of the government COVID–19 driven cash boost. Joining fees were only \$7,715 compared with \$17,664 in the previous financial year and is due to fewer applications for full membership. On the positive side the reduction in income from this category of membership has been filled by a dramatic increase in the number of Crew Members and registrations for SailPASS. This is a promising statistic for the new financial year.

Boatshed net income was approximately \$21,000 less than anticipated in the budget but most other areas of activity were not materially different from expectation.

In the 2019 Treasurer's Report the need for an independent value of the Club's premises was referred to. An independent valuation complying with AASB113 was obtained and the valuation incorporated into the Club's balance sheet. The Clubhouse has been valued at \$1,200,000 and the Mosman Boatshed at \$400,000. This has given an additional boost to the Club's balance sheet increasing its net assets by \$1,258,524 transferred to Asset Revaluation Reserve.

For the first time the Club has been required to comply with the requirements of accounting standard AASB116 to account for leases, which has resulted in the recognition in the balance sheet of a Right of Use Asset and a current and non-current Lease Liability.

In summary, the Club is in a strong financial position with sufficient reserves on which to build a platform for future capital expenditure.

I am extremely grateful for the professionalism and enthusiasm displayed by Paula and Karen in the office and their efforts in ensuring the smooth running of the numerous administration issues including the production of management accounts, streamlining procedures for banking and other areas of the Club's day-to-day operations.

MEMBERSHIP

We are pleased to be able to report that we have recorded our third consecutive year of growth in member numbers and revenue. Total membership has increased from 387 to 446 this year.

This growth has been driven largely by the introduction of the Crew Member category. Crew membership was specifically designed for non-boating sailors who wished to be part of our club, but didn't need access to all the waterfront facilities or moorings. Crew members don't get a vote and if they buy a boat they are obliged to move up to full membership. By the end of the year we had attracted 57 Crew Members and, as a by-product, we have slightly lowered the average age and increased our gender diversity!

The incoming changes to Rule 46 mean that all racing crew will need to either be a member of a sailing club, or hold a SailPASS. In return, the club gets these sailors' details. It was good to see that a couple of SailPASS holders have already been encouraged to move up to become Crew Members.

All other categories have stayed pretty stable, which proved that Crew Membership did not cannibalise Full Membership. We are fortunate in not suffering from excessive 'churn' of members, in fact an SASC member stays with the club for an average of 19 years.

We look forward to further modest growth next year. We're far from outgrowing our facilities and the sustainability of our club can be measured by strength of the membership. It was as a result of the overall increased member numbers that we were able to hold our membership fees at last year's prices at the height of the COVID–19 pandemic.

BOATSHED

It has been a while between fights down at the Amateurs. We all seem to be getting along quite well — it's that idiot Dover's fault. There has been a distinct lack of vice over which to commode this year. Consequently, my reports to the SASC Southern Division, situated along the D'Entrecasteaux Channel, have lacked a certain amount of lurid commentary. Ratings are down. Going to the mountain, by entering *Lonely* in the Classics division for the upcoming season, should go some way to relieving this unnatural calm. Equipping her with sponsor logos from *Frosty Lahood Motors* promises to add the necessary oxygen to the mix.

It would seem that among the myriad of attractions that beguile members of the Amateurs, access to the slipway and the provision of a weekend tender service are particularly valued. The costs involved in operating the boatshed and slip exceed revenue, but we would be a much poorer club without these services. Small scale facilities such as ours, compliant with environmental and safety regulations, are becoming a rarity. Many owners would agree that great is the satisfaction in watching a layabout crew sanding, scraping and painting away their weekend, even though they are not ingesting the great swathes of lead and copper which crews of my vintage now radiate.

Whales are in season and the meat is selling for \$26 per kilo in Tokyo. Those presently venturing out to watch, those boat-wrecking-menaces-to-navigation, as they orphan thousands of cute little baby krill with each swallow, are reminded that our boatshed is well equipped to repair your vessel and render any flesh adhering to your formerly pristine hull. We are however, currently analysing some of our pricing in regard to weekday and weekend slipping rates with the aim of remaining competitive while ensuring ongoing viability. The shed that is green and often resembles a teenager's bedroom, remains a valued resource, but will soon need some complicated repairs to the foundations.

Despite the significant time spent downwind of *Ruby Princess*, the Club's boatshed staff has, to date, remained "Rona" free. Rod Philips and Roy Johnston continued working during this uncertain period and, in fact, undertook some quite challenging work on one vessel which remained on the slip for the better part of a month. Rod has recently needed some repairs himself, but he has continued to keep a watchful eye over operations while Roy has taken charge of daily operations with assistance from Peter Cowman. It has been a pleasure to work with Rod, Roy and Peter over the last year and through recent times.

Jim Paskalis has taken on a great deal of the tender driving during the worst of the pandemic and has been totally reliable. Jim exudes goodwill and competence and provides very readable reports every Monday on the weekend's events, although we discourage his evident discretion in regard to guest lists. We hope to have Alan Williams back on the roster soon and we welcome Jacob Taranto to the driver list. Season wide, I would also like to thank Bob Jackson, Gavin Chua and Will Rees for their efforts on the tender. All our tender drivers seem to experience the occasional glitch with our phones — we will be complementing the mobile service by also equipping the drivers with hand-held VHF's which should increase confusion admirably.

Captain Amora, our starters' boat, has been subject to an ongoing program of refurbishment and maintenance over the last few seasons. None of this would have been achieved without the skill and dedication of volunteers that include Ian Anstee, Mike Warner and John Pennefather. Ian also takes on a great deal of quiet work maintaining the tenders, while John Pennefather also keeps the club dinghies from sinking. The Walker dinghies are no longer in production and suitable replacements have proved difficult to source, so we are hoping to get a few more years from the Walkers provided we can keep them free of leaks.

On any given Sunday and indeed on many weekdays, it is not unusual to find our Commodore on the tools alongside Trevor Cosh and a small group of suspects, surreptitiously undertaking some task that would otherwise cost us thousands of dollars. We are extremely fortunate to have a membership that includes many people with significant skills and a willingness to donate a great deal of time towards keeping the club from sinking into Mosman Bay. Evidence is emerging that a new generation of engineers, experts and volunteers are populating the club and all are welcome to contribute ideas and labour and indeed to join committees or stand for the Board.

It has been a pleasure to serve on our very dedicated Board for another year and to see Paula and Karen integrate so well in the Club's office.

CLUBHOUSE

In spite of these upsets the finances have remained in good order, mainly due to reduced expenditure exceeding the reductions in income. Last season was a period of transition for the clubhouse; we said good-bye to Megan and Judy, and hello to Paula and Karen. There will be changes that follow this transition, however they will be introduced slowly and for the most part invisibly. There are new roles being developed to meet our obligations for the safety of our staff and members. One new position we have trialled is that of a Duty Manager who can provide more stability in the operations of the club, particularly over the weekend racing, when the directors might not be available. A big thanks for the work of all the volunteers, members, the directors and flag officers and most of all to our incredible clubhouse staff — Peter Cowman, Karen Ewels, Bob Jackson, Paula Morel, Alasdair Scott and Libby Tompson.

Tom Moult reports that there has been a healthy increase in membership numbers and, when the clubhouse is fully open, I encourage all members to bring their friends down and enjoy the clubhouse in a Covid-safe way. As restrictions ease normal activities will return, and so we are training our staff and volunteers in emergency response and to be aware of Covid-safe behaviour. We would normally be planning events such as the AGM and the Flag Officers Dinner at this time of year. This year, however, it may be different as we continue to adapt to the restrictions of the "new normal".

New groups of members including crew members and the "SASC Water Women" are looking for ways to participate at the club. Even with all the bad news the lockdown inspired some wonderful new ideas; David Salters' published a daily "Solace of the Sea", the office is emailing a bi-weekly newsletter, we had virtual committee meetings, a virtual bar on Friday evenings and even virtual sailing. All these have helped to overcome the isolation of social distancing. The virtual world cannot, however, replace what became more evident in those quiet months. The real value of the clubhouse is all about the wonderful community that our members create just by being there.

The season ahead promises to be not without challenges, but I know the members and staff will bring their energy, imagination and spirit to bear on making it all work. Fun times and the supportive atmosphere at the clubhouse will continue to make it the place to be on the Harbour.

RACING

We started the season well with a full schedule of racing — our two offshore races and our full harbour schedule were in place. It had been a most enjoyable opening day, Saturday and Sunday racing had started, twilights began in October after the Idle Hour long weekend — it was ticking all the boxes. It was a successful season which, like all things, came to an abrupt halt with COVID–19 and Government restrictions from mid-March 2019 to the end of the season. There was no Club Championship race or Kelly Cup winner in 2020 due to the pandemic restrictions.

The meetings, planning and communication both within our club and with the other clubs was again completed perfectly by our Race Secretary, Alice Murphy who excels at this. Year on year we had a similar number of boats registered with 150 entries for our racing over the season. We have a team of starters and divisional representatives who watch over the sailing and we meet regularly through the year to ensure that we stay in touch and plan ahead. Thank you all for your ongoing efforts, as we can't be the best sailing club on the water without you.

The divisional representatives have all reported good racing with many fleets having very close results after the shortened season. After discussions with TopYacht, we adjusted the handicapping algorithms for some divisions to make the results closer. This change proved to be a success and we regularly review what is available to improve racing at SASC.

The Amateurs 2019-2020

David Salter and Peter Scott, our Saturday Classic Division representatives, combined the two previous divisions into one. Seventeen boats entered the planned 23-week series. There were 20 weeks of racing and the overall winner was *Hoana*, followed by *Vanity* and *Fagel Grip*. In the Classics Spring point score *Hoana* was first, followed by *Fagel Grip* and *Vanity*. The Summer point score winner was *Tamaris* with *Warana* second and *Vanity* third. David and Peter continue to discuss ideas for next season to grow interest and participation in the Classics on Sydney Harbour each Saturday

The Cavalier 28 Division had six boats competing in the planned 14 races. Eleven were completed with *Centaurus* clearly the scratch boat with a win in nine of the races, followed by *Quambi* and *U2*. The handicap champion was *Quambi* followed by *U2* and *Scuttlebutt*

The Saturday Mixed-fleet series winner was *Shambles*, with *Hotspur*² second and *Clewless*? third. This format has proved to be successful and will continue next year. We also trialled a short series in the Mixed Fleet races sailing for the Sheep Station Trophy, combining with the Blues Point Yacht Club, for four races with six entrants from BPYC. Due to weather and COVID–19 there was no trophy winner, but the series will be back next year.

The Super 30s have increased their numbers with 16 entries. The winner was *Very Tasty* followed by *XC3SS* and *Ophir*. The fleet continues to race in the windward–leeward series combining with MHYC and RSYS, plus the Sydney Harbour Regatta.

This year, the Cruiser Racer fleet numbers were lower and they are looking for more support in future years. Both Fleet 26 and Fleet 40 had good close racing. Winners were *Hotspur*² in Fleet 40 and 5 to 6 in Fleet 26. There were 13 boats entered across the two divisions but a lack of consistent participation from week to week is a disappointment. This is a work in progress for all involved for next season.

The Sunday series completed nine races. There are two divisions — the Non-Spinnaker (14 entries) was won by *Samphire* then *As You Do* and *Camilla*. In the Sunday Classics (19 entries) our winner was *Vivienne Marie* followed by *Cherub* and *Josephine*. In November both divisions again supported the RPEYC Woman on Water Regatta which allowed the SASC women to take the helm. This event is very popular and a great success, so we plan to support the event again next season.

Twilight sailing continues to be well supported with three divisions and we had good numbers across the 20 weeks sailed. We planned to finish the season with our regular paella night, however this unfortunately had to be cancelled.

The SASC again supported the Sydney Harbour Regatta and joined the MHYC Race Management team to run the Adams 10, J24 and Cavalier windward–leeward races. A few of our classics went to Pittwater for a weekend of sailing in March and returned to Sydney reporting that it was an enjoyable weekend.

We also work with RSYS, RANSA and RPEYC in the Combined Clubs Winter Series. This is our breakout after COVID–19 restrictions were eased and racing commenced 13 June 2020. Eighty-five boats are entered and with options of a six race or nine race series.

The Lion Island race started the season in gale-force winds offshore so it was sailed in the Harbour with 13 boats competing. The Idle Hour race had 16 entrants this year but the Bob Brown Trophy race had to be cancelled. The Ranger/Couta sprint series was joined by a new Folkboat sprint series. There was only one race day consisting of three short races due to COVID–19 restrictions but it remains popular and will continue to be an annual event.

Congratulations to all our competitors for another successful season. We have some new yachts racing this season and hope that you will join us again in 2020–21 as well as those who haven't yet experienced the fun and camaraderie enjoyed by our racing skippers.

Thanks to John Jeremy who worked with Alice to ensure the sailing instructions and courses were workable. Thank you to the Saturday starters, Tony Barry, Tony Clarkson and Mike Warner. On Sundays John Jeremy and Charles Maclurcan; on Friday Twilights we have had many trainee race officers which is what the Club needs. A BIG thanks to all our volunteers who continue to dedicate their time to be part of our Race Management team. You keep us racing — without this team we have nothing.

Following the adoption of a new club constitution in May 2019 the number of Directors was reduced from 15 to 11. As a result, a number of Directors have retired at the Annual General Meeting of 7 August 2019. Directors have been in office since the start of the financial year to the date of this report unless otherwise stated.

PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES OF THE COMPANY

The principal continuing activity of the Company during the financial year was to promote the sport of amateur sailing.

TRADING RESULTS

The operating loss after income tax of the Company for the year to 31 May 2020 was \$62,129 (2019: loss of \$26,883).

REVIEW OF OPERATIONS

Management notes that COVID-19 was declared a global health emergency on 31 January 2020 by the World Health Organisation and that, subsequently, the Australian and NSW Government authorities issued orders that all non-essential businesses be closed effective 25 March 2020. Consequently, the Club ceased its racing and social activities which resulted in a decrease in revenue from these sectors for the months of April and May. Club administration and slipway operations continued, on a restricted basis.

The Club recorded its third consecutive year of growth in member numbers and subscription revenue. Total membership has increased from 387 to 446 this year — including 57 new Crew Members.

DIVIDEND

No dividend has been recommended or paid during the year as the Company's Constitution does not permit payment of dividends.

SIGNIFICANT CHANGES IN STATE OF AFFAIRS

There are no changes to the principal activity of the Company i.e. the promotion of the sport of amateur sailing, under the new Constitution.

AFTER BALANCE SHEET DATE EVENTS

Management notes that COVID-19 was declared a global health emergency on 31 January 2020 by the World Health Organisation and that, subsequently, the Australian and NSW Government authorities issued orders that all non-essential businesses be closed effective 25 March 2020. As previously noted, the Club ceased its racing and social activities which resulted in a decrease in revenue from these sectors for the months of April and May.

Whilst the Government health authorities have eased some restrictions allowing the Club to resume some limited racing and social operation from 14 June 2020, the COVID-19 pandemic continues to be ongoing with the possibility of restrictions being reimposed in the future. The COVID-19 pandemic is unprecedented and as such management will pay close attention to the development of the situation and will continue to assess the impact of any future restrictions on Club operations.

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DIRECTORS' REPORT

Other than the matter outlined above, no matter or circumstances have arisen since the end of the financial year which significantly affected or may significantly affect the operations of the Company, the results of those operations, or the state of affairs of the Company in subsequent financial years.

LIKELY DEVELOPMENTS AND RESULTS

The Company will continue to promote the sport of amateur sailing through its racing and training programs.

ENVIRONMENTAL REGULATIONS

The Company operations are subject to environmental regulation under laws of the Commonwealth, State and Local governments. The directors are not aware of any outstanding breaches of those regulations.

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NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MAY 2020

1. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Preparation

The financial statements are general purpose financial statements that have been prepared in accordance with Australian Accounting Standards – Reduced Disclosure Requirements of the Australian Accounting Standards Board and the Corporations Act 2001. The Company is a not-for-profit entity for financial reporting purposes under Australian Accounting Standards.

Australian Accounting Standards set out accounting policies that the AASB has concluded would result in financial statements containing relevant and reliable information about transactions, events and conditions. Material accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these financial statements are presented below and have been consistently applied unless stated otherwise.

The financial statements have been prepared on an accruals basis and are based on historical costs, modified, where applicable, by the measurement at fair value of selected non-current assets, financial assets and financial liabilities.

The financial statements are presented in Australian dollars.

(a) New or Amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations Adopted.

The Company has adopted all of the new or amended Accounting Standards and Interpretations issued by the Australian Accounting Standards Board ('AASB') that are mandatory for the current reporting period.

Any new or amended Accounting Standards or Interpretations that are not yet mandatory have not been early adopted. The following Accounting Standards and Interpretations are most relevant to the Company:

AASB 16 Leases

The Company has adopted AASB 16 from 1 June 2019. The standard replaces AASB 117 'Leases' and for lessees eliminates the classifications of operating leases and finance leases. Except for short-term leases and leases of low-value assets, right-of-use assets and corresponding lease liabilities are recognised in the statement of financial position. Straight-line operating lease expense recognition is replaced with a depreciation charge for the right-of-use assets (included in operating costs) and an interest expense on the recognised lease liabilities (included in finance costs).

In the earlier periods of the lease, the expenses associated with the lease under AASB 16 will be higher when compared to lease expenses under AASB 117. However, EBITDA (Earnings Before Interest, Tax, Depreciation and Amortisation) results improve as the operating expense is now replaced by interest expense and depreciation in profit or loss. For classification within the statement of cash flows, the interest portion is disclosed in operating activities and the principal portion of the lease payments are separately disclosed in financing activities. For lessor accounting, the standard does not substantially change how a lessor accounts for leases.

Impact of adoption

AASB 16 was adopted using the modified retrospective approach and as such the comparatives have not been restated. The impact of adoption has seen the recognition of the following balances as at 1 June 2019:

(b) Income

No provision for income tax has been raised as the entity is exempt from income tax under Div 50 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

(c) Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents includes cash on hand, deposits held at call with financial institutions, other short-term, highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less that are readily convertible to known amounts of cash and which are subject to an insignificant risk of changes in value. For the statement of cash flows presentation purposes, cash and cash equivalents also includes bank overdrafts, which are shown within borrowings in current liabilities on the statement of financial position.

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NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MAY 2020

1. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

(d) Trade and other receivables

Trade receivables are initially recognised at fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any allowance for expected credit losses. Trade receivables are generally due for settlement within 30 days.

The company has applied the simplified approach to measuring expected credit losses, which uses a lifetime expected loss allowance. To measure the expected credit losses, trade receivables have been grouped based on days overdue.

Other receivables are recognised at amortised cost, less any allowance for expected credit losses.

(e) Inventories

Inventories are measured at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Costs are assigned on a first in first out basis.

(f) Investments and other financial assets

Investments and other financial assets are initially measured at fair value. Transaction costs are included as part of the initial measurement, except for financial assets at fair value through profit or loss. Such assets are subsequently measured at either amortised cost or fair value depending on their classification. Classification is determined based on both the business model within which such assets are held and the contractual cash flow characteristics of the financial asset unless an accounting mismatch is being avoided.

Financial assets are derecognised when the rights to receive cash flows have expired or have been transferred and the company has transferred substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership. When there is no reasonable expectation of recovering part or all of a financial asset, it's carrying value is written off.

Financial assets at fair value through profit or loss

Financial assets not measured at amortised cost or at fair value through other comprehensive income are classified as financial assets at fair value through profit or loss. Typically, such financial assets will be either: (i) held for trading, where they are acquired for the purpose of selling in the short-term with an intention of making a profit, or a derivative; or (ii) designated as such upon initial recognition where permitted. Fair value movements are recognised in profit or loss.

Impairment of financial assets

The company recognises a loss allowance for expected credit losses on financial assets which are either measured at amortised cost or fair value through other comprehensive income. The measurement of the loss allowance depends upon the company's assessment at the end of each reporting period as to whether the financial instrument's credit risk has increased significantly since initial recognition, based on reasonable and supportable information that is available, without undue cost or effort to obtain.

Where there has not been a significant increase in exposure to credit risk since initial recognition, a 12-month expected credit loss allowance is estimated. This represents a portion of the asset's lifetime expected credit losses that is attributable to a default event that is possible within the next 12 months. Where a financial asset has become credit impaired or where it is determined that credit risk has increased significantly, the loss allowance is based on the asset's lifetime expected credit losses. The amount of expected credit loss recognised is measured on the basis of the probability weighted present value of anticipated cash shortfalls over the life of the instrument discounted at the original effective interest rate.

For financial assets mandatorily measured at fair value through other comprehensive income, the loss allowance is recognised in other comprehensive income with a corresponding expense through profit or loss. In all other cases, the loss allowance reduces the asset's carrying value with a corresponding expense through profit or loss.

(g) Trade and other payables

These amounts represent liabilities for goods and services provided to the company prior to the end of the financial year and which are unpaid. Due to their short-term nature they are measured at amortised cost and are not discounted. The amounts are unsecured and are usually paid within 30 days of recognition.

(h) Property, Plant and Equipment

Property, plant and equipment is carried at cost or fair values as indicated, less, where applicable, accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.

The carrying amount of plant and equipment is reviewed annually by directors to ensure it is not in excess of the recoverable amount from these assets.

The depreciable amount of all fixed assets are depreciated on a straight line basis over their useful lives to the economic entity commencing from the time the asset is held ready for use.

The carrying values of plant and equipment are reviewed for impairment at each reporting date, with recoverable amounts being estimated when events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying value may be impaired. Impairment exists when the carrying value of an asset exceeds its estimate recoverable amount. The asset is then written down to its recoverable amount.

(i) Right-of-use Assets

A right-of-use asset is recognised at the commencement date of a lease. The right-of-use asset is measured at cost, which comprises the initial amount of the lease liability, adjusted for, as applicable, any lease payments made at or before the commencement date net of any lease incentives received, any initial direct costs incurred, and, except where included in the cost of inventories, an estimate of costs expected to be incurred for dismantling and removing the underlying asset, and restoring the site or asset.

Right-of-use assets are depreciated on a straight-line basis over the unexpired period of the lease or the estimated useful life of the asset, whichever is the shorter. Where the company expects to obtain ownership of the leased asset

at the end of the lease term, the depreciation is over its estimated useful life. Right-of use assets are subject to impairment or adjusted for any remeasurement of lease liabilities.

The company has elected not to recognise a right-of-use asset and corresponding lease liability for short-term leases with terms of 12 months or less and leases of low-value assets. Lease payments on these assets are expensed to profit or loss as incurred.

Gains and losses on disposal are determined by comparing proceeds with the carrying amount. These gains and losses are included in the statement of comprehensive income.

(j) Impairment of Assets

At the end of each reporting period, the entity assesses whether there is any indication that an asset may be impaired. If such an indication exists, an impairment test is carried out on the asset by comparing the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the asset's fair value less costs to sell and value in use, to the asset's carrying amount. Any excess of the asset's carrying amount over its recoverable amount is recognised immediately in profit or loss, unless the asset is carried at a revalued amount in accordance with another Standard (eg in accordance with the revaluation model in AASB 116). Any impairment loss of a revalued asset is treated as a revaluation decrease in accordance with that other Standard.

Where the future economic benefits of the asset are not primarily dependent upon the asset's ability to generate net cash inflows and when the entity would, if deprived of the asset, replace its remaining future economic benefits, value in use is depreciated replacement cost of an asset.

Where it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an asset class, the entity estimates the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the class of assets belong.

(k) Employee Benefits

Provision is made for the Company's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to balance sheet date. Employee benefits that are expected to be settled within one year have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled plus related on costs. Employee benefits payable later than one year have been measured at the present value of the estimated future cash outflows to be made for those benefits. Long service leave is accrued in respect of all employees.

Contributions are made by the Company to an employee superannuation fund and are charged as expenses when incurred.

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NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MAY 2020

1. STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

(I) Lease liability

A lease liability is recognised at the commencement date of a lease. The lease liability is initially recognised at the present value of the lease payments to be made over the term of the lease, discounted using the interest rate implicit in the lease or, if that rate cannot be readily determined, the company's incremental borrowing rate. Lease payments comprise of fixed payments less any lease incentives receivable, variable lease payments that depend on an index or a rate, amounts expected to be paid under residual value guarantees, exercise price of a purchase option when the exercise of the option is reasonably certain to occur, and any anticipated termination penalties. The variable lease payments that do not depend on an index or a rate are expensed in the period in which they are incurred.

Lease liabilities are measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. The carrying amounts are remeasured if there is a change in the following: future lease payments arising from a change in an index or a rate used; residual guarantee; lease term; certainty of a purchase option and termination penalties. When a lease liability is remeasured, an adjustment is made to the corresponding right-of use asset, or to profit or loss if the carrying amount of the right-of-use asset is fully written down.

(m) Revenue Recognition

The company recognises revenue as follows:

Revenue from contracts with customers

Revenue is recognised at an amount that reflects the consideration to which the company is expected to be entitled in exchange for transferring goods or services to a customer. For each contract with a customer, the company: identifies the contract with a customer; identifies the performance obligations in the contract; determines the transaction price which takes into account estimates of variable consideration and the time value of money; allocates the transaction price to the separate performance obligations on the basis of the relative stand-alone selling price of each distinct good or service to be delivered; and recognises revenue when or as each performance obligation is satisfied in a manner that depicts the transfer to the customer of the goods or services promised.

Variable consideration within the transaction price, if any, reflects concessions provided to the customer such as discounts, rebates and refunds, any potential bonuses receivable from the customer and any other contingent events. Such estimates are determined using either the 'expected value' or 'most likely amount' method. The measurement of variable consideration is subject to a constraining principle whereby revenue will only be recognised to the extent that it is highly probable that a significant reversal in the amount of cumulative revenue recognised will not occur.

The measurement constraint continues until the uncertainty associated with the variable consideration is subsequently resolved. Amounts received that are subject to the constraining principle are recognised as a refund liability.

Subscriptions received

Revenue from membership fees is recognised on a pro-rata basis over the membership period.

Rendering of services

Revenue from a contract to provide services is recognised over time as the services are rendered based on either a fixed price or an hourly rate.

Interest

Interest revenue is recognised as interest accrues using the effective interest method. This is a method of calculating the amortised cost of a financial asset and allocating the interest income over the relevant period using the effective interest rate, which is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash receipts through the expected life of the financial asset to the net carrying amount of the financial asset.

(m) Revenue Recognition (continued)

Other revenue

Other revenue is recognised when it is received or when the right to receive payment is established.

(n) Goods and Services Tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australian Tax Office. In these circumstances the GST is recognised as part of the cost of

acquisition of the asset or as part of an item of the expense. Receivables and payables in the statement of financial position are shown inclusive of GST.

Cash flows are presented in the cash flow statement on a gross basis, except for the GST component of investing and financing activities, which are disclosed as operating cash flows.

(o) Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the entity has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured.

Provisions recognised represent the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

(p) Fair Value Measurement

When an asset or liability, financial or non-financial, is measured at fair value for recognition or disclosure purposes, the fair value is based on the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date; and assumes that the transaction will take place either: in the principal market; or in the absence of a principal market, in the most advantageous market.

Fair value is measured using the assumptions that market participants would use when pricing the asset or liability, assuming they act in their economic best interests. For non-financial assets, the fair value measurement is based on its highest and best use. Valuation techniques that are appropriate in the circumstances and for which sufficient data are available to measure fair value, are used, maximising the use of relevant observable inputs and minimising the use of unobservable inputs. Assets and liabilities measured at fair value are classified into three levels using a fair value hierarchy that reflects the significance of the inputs used in making the measurements. Classifications are reviewed at each reporting date and transfers between levels are determined based on a reassessment of the lowest level of input that is significant to the fair value measurement.

For recurring and non-recurring fair value measurements, external valuers may be used when internal expertise is either not available or when the valuation is deemed to be significant. External valuers are selected based on market knowledge and reputation. Where there is a significant change in fair value of an asset or liability from one period to another, an analysis is undertaken, which includes a verification of the major inputs applied in the latest valuation and a comparison, where applicable, with external sources of data.

(q) Comparative Figures

Where required by Accounting Standards comparative figures have been adjusted to conform with changes in presentation for the current financial year.

When an entity applies an accounting policy retrospectively, makes a retrospective restatement or reclassifies items in its financial statements, a statement of financial position as at the beginning of the earliest comparative period must be disclosed.

(r) Going Concern

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis which assumes that the Company will be able to pay its debts as and when they fall due. The directors have confirmed this basis in the directors' declaration on page 23.

(s) Critical Accounting Estimates and Judgements

The directors evaluate estimates and judgements incorporated into the financial statements based on historical knowledge and best available current information. Estimates assume a reasonable expectation of future events and are based on current trends and economic data obtained both externally and within the company.

19. MAINTENANCE ON COMPANY ASSETS

The Company's slipway staff from time to time carry out maintenance on Company assets. Based on the time spent by staff and their hourly rates determined by the directors, we estimate the cost for the year to be \$35,050 (last year \$41,460). All staff costs however remain in the statement of comprehensive income as wages under employee benefits expense.

For the benefit of members, we have shown this as a separate expense and income under "Boatshed" in the attached supplementary details of income & expenditure, which reflects the profit and loss of each department.

20. EVENTS AFTER THE BALANCE DATE

Management notes that COVID-19 was declared a global health emergency on January 31, 2020 by the World Health Organisation and that subsequently the Australian and NSW Government authorities issued orders that all non-essential businesses be closed effective 25 March 2020. As previously noted, the club ceased its racing and social activities which resulted in a decrease in revenue from these sectors for the months of April and May.

Whilst the Government health authorities have eased some restrictions allowing the club to resume some limited racing and social operation from June 14, 2020, the COVID-19 pandemic continues to be ongoing with the possibility of restrictions being reimposed in the future. The COVID-19 pandemic is unprecedented and as such management will pay close attention to the development of the situation and will continue to assess the impact of any future restrictions on club operations.

Other than the matter outlined above, no matter or circumstances have arisen since the end of the financial year which significantly affected or may significantly affect the operations of the Company, the results of those operations, or the state of affairs of the Company in subsequent financial years.
